Tentmakers' Latin Ministry Expands

With a vision for expanded ministry among Latin populations, Tentmakers Bible Mission has added Franc and Mary Ortega to its missionary family. The Ortegas make their home just a few miles form the Mexican border in the Rio Grande Valley of Southern Texas.

Franc, a native of General Bravo, Mexico, serves as Pastor of the Maranatha Christian Bible Church of McAllen, Texas, – formerly the Latin American Bible Church. His wife, Mary, was born and spent her early years in the country of Panama, where she came to Christ through the ministry of New Tribes missionaries. (We plan to share Mary's unusual testimony in a later issue of Tentmaker News). Franc and Mary met during their Bible training years at Rio Grande Bible Institute.

The Ortega's long-term missionary sights with TBM are set on the country of Spain, after perhaps two years of continued service in their present ministry in Southern Texas.

TBM is thankful to have this fine family as part of its Mission family. Additional Latin nationals are now in the application process with TBM ministries among their own people.

Evangelistic Program Held In City Park


Music, mime, puppets, and preaching were all used effectively in proclaiming the gospel to a large neighborhood crowd in the city park of Pharr, Texas, just north of the Mexican border last December.

The open-air evangelistic ministry was conducted by a group of Latin students from the Rio Grande Bible Institute of Edinburg, Texas, under the direction of TBM missionaries Bill and Gail Marietta. Prior to the program the students went door-to door in the immediate neighborhood inviting parents and children to the hour-long presentation. A crowd of about 100 parents and children, most of them seated on bleachers, some seated in their cars, some on bicycles, and a few sitting in trees, listened intently as the students gave several Spanish presentations of the gospel.

At the conclusion of the program the Bible school students circulated in the crowd for tract distribution and personal evangelism.

'... LORD BLESS THE MISSIONARY"

"The nonsense that missionaries are a special people with special strength and unusual devotion has caused enough harm. I've never met a missionary who believes this myth, but there seems to be hardly a church member who does not."

That statement appears on a prayer card of one of my missionary friends. And I believe it. For the past 30 years I have had some wonderful prayer-partners. But my best prayer-partners have been those who have known me best. Because they know me, they pray for "real", not imagined needs.

How can we know these needs? Look into your own heart. Except for geography it is the heart of the missionary.

- Pray the heart need of FAITH will be met in the missionary. "Lord, strengthen the missionary's faith. May he trust you for every need." Visible results are often slow in coming and great faith is needed when sowing seed. A missionary may even fear returning home from the field, "empty-handed." Pray he will leave all results, or lack of results, with God. I Cor. 3:6
- Pray God will grant real WISDOM. Wisdom is needed in dealing with one's spiritual children, fellow missionaries and our own families. Wisdom in speech and actions is important. Incompatability is easily the mission field's most deadly virus. James 1:5-6, "If any of you lack wisdom."
- Pray he will have VISTON and maintain a CLEAR PICTURE of what is happening on the field. The missionary must not exaggerate "results", nor should he miss a blessing when the Lord sends it. "God, grant the missionary the ability to see the spiritual impact of the Word on lives." I Cor. 2:10-16
- 4. Pray the missionary's LOVE will increase, and that his love for the lost will not grow cold. Pray his willingness to forgive will remain active, not in word only—but also in heart. John 13:35
- 5. Pray he will have JOY day-by-day. Routine often destroys this. Pray he will never forget to laugh. It is good medicine. Pray he will never lose the joy of his calling. I Cor. 7:20
- 6. Pray he will have PEACE, no fear at all. Jer. 1:8-10
- 7. Pray the missionary will be AT HOME in the place he is called. "Wherever you are, be all there" is good advice. Pray about that "culture shock" and language adjust-

- ment. To swing into a diet of foreign food and a foreign language can create acute homesickness. Phil. 4:11-12
- 8. Pray for PURITY. "Lord, keep the missionary pure in mind." The field of service makes no difference. How easy to falter here. I Tim. 4:16
- 9. Pray for VICTORY. "Lord, make that missionary victorious with his own children." Our children are the greatest mission field we have. Noah was a success with his own children and was honored of God in Hebrews 11, the faith chapter.
- 10. Pray for TIME. "Lord, help that missionary not to get too busy." Missionaries, as all Christians, need time for prayer and family. Eph. 4:15-17
