
## Winter at the intercontinental border!

Ministry at our church-plant: Our goal to establish a Bible-teaching ministry center, that would be serving the community is a reality now. We have a store-front to serve from and a weekly rotation of activities. There is so much to be thankful for. One BIG prayer request would be that more people would come through the door.

Sunday Services at Agua Viva: Our services begin with a call to worship and Scripture reading, followed by our praise time, which is sometimes bilingual, as some Sundays we have more English speakers than Spanish speakers. Other Sundays the Music and Bible teaching are all in Spanish. This December and all the way up January 6th, we enjoyed singing through many of the old carols that are so full of rich imagery of the birth of Messiah. Everyone who attended also enjoyed digging into the Messianic prophecies and all of their fulfillments in the New Testament and in the person of Christ Jesus.

Some of you reading this know very well what it means to live many years outside of your culture of origin. In the new culture one goes through several phases of adaptation and tinkering to see what mission methods work or don't work. But seriously, we were very encouraged this summer having helpers assist in getting our first activities started, and we also have had a number of locals drift through or come to visit, and with the Fall season the novelty of our ministry center seems to have worn off. With time, it was obvious that some visitors were coming to see what they could get out of us as the Western missionaries. Sara grew up with these situations all the time in Mexico and JD has written on this very subject, but beyond all our stories in missions there is a


## simple prayer request.


