


God provided us ample opportunities to spread the word about church planting and our new handcrafts ministry. We almost postponed the trip because of the skyrocketing gas prices, but then we had a supporter sponsor the trip.

Answered Prayer

As many of you know, we are starting a new ministry to both aid in our future church planting and provide a longterm residency strategy for our family. The idea for it was born out of the collective effort of national Christians and myself to provide a viable solution to a formidable problem. The problem being that poverty in the countryside means a church cannot support a pastor, and finding someone willing to add shepherding to their regular work uncompensated is difficult. These kinds to problems do not resolve themselves. They require intentional and decisive action. After much prayer and direction from God, we are determined to see this ministry through.

Our work to import and sell fairtrade products to breath vitality into poverty-stricken church communities is anything but novel. There are other such efforts with similar goals being done successfully these days. One of which has been in existence for more than 75 years (Ten Thousand Villages). Another one that I know of is called Zam*bee*zi.

I became familiar with Zambeezi while at bible college in Wyoming because they had moved their operations there while I was attending college. They import raw materials (as well as handcrafted soaps) purchased fair-trade from Zambian bee keepers as a way to help fund christian ministries in Zambia. They take the organic beeswax and honey to produce lip balm and body balm. A friend of ours, whom we met at bible college, manages the logistics and operations of the company. He has experience in fair-trade operations, importing products into the US, selling online, and he also has his own business of taking online orders and fulfilling them. While we were in Wyoming we got to talk with him at length about all of his experience and what we will be doing in on the field. He was an incredible source of information and encouragement. His whole family ministered to us in so many ways. He's agreed to provide his services to warehouse our imported products and fulfill online orders. Thank you Hales!

God has answered prayers in awesome ways, and this has encouraged us all the more to keep moving forward. Thank you God!

With our mission updates done and the logistics for the business figured out, the final task that needs to be finished before we can get back to the field is to finish the fund raising for the handcrafts ministry. That's it. That's the last thing. Once we are at 100% we can get back. We are currently at 35%. I check periodically to see if the government has lowered the required amount to 50k, and unfortunately they haven't as of yet. In the months ahead we will be seeking out new partners who want to reach those who have not yet heard the Gospel.
